

Use of Trolleys and Personal Ride-on Buggies

Winter Course Protection Actions

It is the aim of the golf club to provide a golf course, set and maintained to recognised and established high standards, which enable golf to be played whenever weather and ground conditions permit.

During winter months a number of actions are put in place to protect the course: -

- Artificial teeing areas
- Temporary greens
- Traffic management routes (roping off areas around greens and other areas)
- Restricting or prohibiting the use of trollies and buggies
- Partial or total closure of the course

Restricting the use of trollies and buggies

The club will endeavor not to impose course closures or trolley bans unless they are absolutely necessary.

However all players, who are able to do so, are encouraged to use carry bags and carry their clubs if they are playing in the winter months, even if it means a reduced number of clubs in the bag.

Electric trollies are detrimental to the course in wet conditions, as their skidding action generates muddy areas, delaying turf recovery in the spring and also creating potential hazards to member.

Five Stage Trolley Policy

Trollies and buggies are allowed on the course, in winter, at the discretion of the Greens Chairman and Head Greenkeeper. A five-stage policy is used to allow as much use of trollies and buggies as course conditions allow. The five stages are: -

- 1. Normal use
- 2. Restricted Buggy Use (9 holes)
- 3. Authorized Buggy Use Only (9 holes)
- 4. Total Trolley ban
- 5. Course Closed.

This policy is managed by the General Manager in consultation with the Head Greenkeeper and will apply equally to members and visitors.

This concession is primarily intended for older members and those with a medical condition, which would preclude them from carrying a bag.
